Important Information

The English Literature Placement test is a free assessment designed for Academic Upgrading placement purposes only. No section of the test may be used for admission to any SAIT program other than Academic Upgrading. The English Literature Placement Test is not accepted for admission to any other institution nor does it determine English language proficiency. This assessment will determine entrance into English Language Arts 20-1 or English Language Arts 30-1.

- A mark of 50-69% is required to pass and meet the basic English Language Arts admission requirement for the Academic Upgrading program and place into COMM 181 (English Language Arts 20-1).
- A mark of 70-100% is required to be placed into COMM 182 (English Language Arts 30-1).
- We aim to put students' passing marks on our system within 2 business days of successful completion of the test.
- Students who have been accepted into the Academic Upgrading program can register for the course they are placed into once we have granted them permission based on their passing grades.
- Students who have already taken and passed SAIT's Academic Upgrading courses in Math and Physics ARE NOT required to take a placement test.

English Literature Placement Study Guide

This study guide is designed to prepare students for the Academic Upgrading English Literature placement test for entry into English Language Arts 20-1 or English Language Arts 30-1.

This test is for placement into English Language Arts 20-1 (COMM 181) or English Language Arts 30-1 (COMM 182).

- The placement test will consist of 45 questions and is composed of **grammar**, **reading and literature comprehension**.
- Students should allow for 90 minutes to complete the test. An additional 30 minutes has been added to allow for accommodated time, for a total test time of 120 minutes.

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- You may not use a dictionary, thesaurus, or other reference materials.
- All questions are multiple choice; you do not have to show your work.
- Make sure you understand all directions before you begin each part.
- This test is to be written in the Testing Centre.
- No part of this exam can be used to determine English Proficiency at SAIT.
